Children in the Theatre

There is great debate at the moment in the Am Dram world about a new law being introduced that will affect anyone wanting to undertake *regulated activity* with children or vulnerable adults.

From July this year anyone planning to work with children for the first time will be required to register with the Independent Safe-guarding Authority (ISA) and must be registered by November. From then on it will be illegal to employ new people who are not ISA-registered. Sponsored by the Home Office ISA has been created to replace the scheme run by the Criminal Records Bureau (CRB).

To register with the ISA for new helpers will cost £64 and from April 2011 all those currently working with children be it on stage or back stage, amateur or professional, will be expected to register within 5 years.

The new legislation, often referred to as the 'vetting and barring scheme', could have a major impact on amateur shows particularly dancing shows; the Barn has already experienced a couple of cancellations. Few people are likely to want to pay the fee to register and few societies will be able to afford to register their members.

Amateur theatre is in a particularly difficult position. Professional shows, particularly those in the West End, have full chaperoning arrangements in place already in a way that amateur shows cannot.

The argument is that this legislation is designed for those who are in paid employment. People in amateur theatre are there for the love of it — that's what amateur means. This is being written before the election. A new government may decide that it is not in the best interests of voluntary organisations to extend ISA to volunteer helpers.

NODA and other umbrella organisations are active in monitoring and helping to guide societies through the procedure. What ISA could do is to make many thousands of perfectly decent adults reluctant to work with children in shows. If so, it will be the children who lose out.
