

Having completed our successful run of our Youth production, *The Pied Piper*, we moved swiftly onto the preparations for *The Cemetery Club* by Ivan Menchell which ended our 2008/9 season. The play achieved very complimentary reviews and provided its audiences with a great evening's entertainment. Our thanks to Wendy O'Mahony, Trish Richings, Julie Madigan, Jackie Barrett and Mike Rourke for their hard work and commitment to the play.

We now look forward to a busy 2008/9 season beginning with our annual Youth Workshop directed by David Rowan from 18 to 23 August 2008. The Workshop is open to all members of our Society and was quickly oversubscribed. After the week of preparation, on the Saturday the youngsters will be performing David's adaptation of *The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe* to an audience of family and friends. This will be the tenth anniversary of our Summer Workshop and coincidentally *The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe* was the first play David directed for us 10 years ago.

Unfortunately we have had to abandon *The Anniversary* owing to a lack of participating men of the appropriate age and our Autumn Production will now be *Benefactors* by Michael Frayn (15-18 October 2008). This is a play shot through with Frayn's wit and humour and is about the way the world changes around you just when you are trying to change it yourself. The plot centres on David and Jane, who are a happy and prosperous couple and by contrast, their neighbours, Colin and Sheila, who are a bitter and struggling couple. David, an architect, is currently working on the redevelopment of an inner city slum this propels him and his wife to take on their neighbours as their next 'redevelopment' project. Michael Frayn's play explores the contrasting natures of those who help and those who are helped; those who create and those who destroy. At the time of going to press we still looking to cast the two ladies. One is Jane, an anthropologist, who asserts her increasing emotional and career independence from her architect husband, David, as the play progresses; she has clear insights into the impact of the characters on each other's lives and on the community they believe they are helping. A strong character who perhaps is the only one to emerge with any credibility. The other is Sheila, originally a nurse, who lives in awe and some fear of her intellectual friends, Jane and David, and her domineering and cynical journalist husband, Colin. Sheila's journey through the play sees her gain self confidence and self awareness, via an infatuation with David. She remains, however, more a victim than an instigator of events. In the West End this character was played by Emma Chambers whom you may remember as Alice in The Vicar of Dibley.
