Amongst the other groups taking part are Tonbridge Theatre and Arts Club, Stag Theatre Company, and Lighted Fools, so the competition will be very strong this year. Minack Magic

We are thrilled to confirm that the Barn Theatre have been invited to return to the Minack with a show during the May bank holiday week, May 31 to June 4 2010. The trustees have asked Richard Allen if Barnstormers will again work in partnership with the theatre in producing another spectacular Minack Musical. We are delighted that Richard has accepted the invitation so watch this space.

By the way did you know that the UK, despite the climate, has a flourishing outdoor theatre season, with many National Trust Properties now staging Open Air theatre during the summer months. Arguably the two best known Open Air spaces are Regents Park Open Air Theatre in the heart of London, and the Minack Theatre, built on the cliff next to Porthcurno beach in Cornwall. Both have similar histories, both opened in 1932 and each have a 16 week season.

The Minack Theatre was the brainchild of the devoted and determined Rowena Cade; the theatre was planned, built and financed by her from 1931 until she died in 1983. The first production was The Tempest in 1932. Since then it has seen every genre of theatre, including comedy, tragedy, farce, opera, and musicals. There are devoted fans who come every week like an old-style repertory audience.

Today given the credit crunch fewer Britons will be travelling abroad and more Americans and other foreign tourists will be visiting the UK so the next couple of years should see even greater numbers braving the English climate and enjoying outdoor theatre.
