NODA Accolades for OJOS and TOPs

Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat

From the opening scene, it was clear that the standard and high performance value of the OOS adult group permeate perfectly to the junior group. The pace and energy were superb and my daughter, Eve, four, was captivated constantly through both acts without a fidget or lapse in concentration - no mean feat for any production! This is one of the best youth productions I have seen in a long time and all I can say is that the OOS adult casts had better watch out as they have some serious competition in the youth group but how nice to know that the future of the group is so bright with this sort of talent coming up through junior members.

My Boy Jack

Rudyard Kipling and David Haig (writer) would have approved of and enjoyed Elizabeth Callows's production, My Boy Jack, which tells the tale of Kiplings's only son being sent off to fight in the trenches in France in World War I.

The attention to detail was apparent in all areas, not just the staging and acting performances. The set and costumes too were some of the most exquisite I have seen in some time. The Batemans' drawing room was outstanding and having seen the real thing impressed me greatly, down to the very smallest dressing. Martin Beatty, its designer, had help from master painter, Patrick Tricker and friends to make it look incredibly realistic. Muriel Lister and her stage management team ensured that scene changes were slick and effortless, transforming and transporting us in to the trenches of the Western Front in moments.

It must have been an inspiration for the cast of ten as each and every performance was noteworthy in its unique and deft delivery. Every character had depth and breadth, belying the tender years of some of the principal troupe. Jacob Carter as John Kipling was particularly striking and managed to get across the attitudes and behaviour of the time incredibly for someone of 16. living 100 years after the time. Megan Saunders (Elsie), too was an incredibly affectionate sister and the scenes played out between the two of the were as moving as they were captivating. The Irish Guardsmen, George Cooper, Keir Gilbert-Halladey and Alex Barnett helped us to gain some small insight into the frightening prospect of trench warfare. Further plaudits must go to Chris Bassett (Rudyard) and Alex Barnett who was the incredibly believable shell-shocked Irish Guardsman, Michael Bowe. However, for me, it was Ghislaine Bowden as Carrie Kipling, with her broad and totally accurate turn of the century US accent, who stood out as her emotional responses were just incredible.

Child Performance Legislation

As you may be aware, the Government issued a policy statement in December 2013 concerning the proposal to make changes to the Child Performance legislation. An amendment to the Children and Families Bill is currently progressing through parliament. As the legislation dates back to 1968 the amendments are long overdue. The Department for Education is currently consulting on their proposal to change the allowed performance times and breaks and a few other aspects of the child performance regulations. They are keen to have the view of young people who are, or have been, involved in performances, to help inform their decision and final proposals. Therefore Surrey County Council invited the Barn Theatre to run a workshop on behalf of the DfE to gain the views of young people. We were delighted to have been chosen to represent Surrey and ran the workshop with the young people from Kenley Holiday Workshop.

It was a privilege to spend the morning with such a superb group of young people who took part enthusiastically in the workshop and gave some really interesting responses to the questions posed.

Theatrical Logic!!

In is down, down is front. Out is up, up is back. Off is out, on is in. And of course, left is right and right is left. A drop shouldn't and a 'block and fall' does neither. A prop doesn't and a cove has no water. Tripping is OK. A running crew rarely gets anywhere . A purchase line buys you nothing. A trap will not catch anything. A gridiron has nothing to do with football. Strike is work (in fact, a lot of work). And a green room, thank God, usually isn't. Now that you're fully versed in theatrical terms, break a leg.

But not really!



As a fitting commemoration of the 100 year anniversary of the start of World War I last month, we presented My Boy Jack by David Haig. Based on true events involving the renowned author and poet Rudyard Kipling, the play charts the tragedy which befell his family, mirroring the experience of countless other families during that devastating period in our history. However, in this case family conflict arose by reason of Rudyard's determination that his myopic son John should go to war, despite having failed Navy and Army medicals. Nevertheless Rudyard's military contact secured John a commission in the Irish Guards.

Under the experienced and careful direction of Elizabeth Callow, with an authentic set, depicting Batemans, designed by Martin Beatty and with an excellent cast, our audiences were transported back in time to 1913 and onwards into battle and beyond. The Barn stage was transformed into the drawing room at Batemans, the East Sussex home of the Kiplings and then into a battlefield on the Western Front.

Chris Bassett was Rudyard, the devoted father but also passionate about King and Country and Ghislaine Bowden played his American born wife Carrie, a no nonsense lady driven to emotional turmoil by the loss of her son. Megan



Saunders, showing such maturity beyond her 16 years, gave us a feisty Elsie who had no hesitation in challenging her father's actions. Jacob Carter, also 16, portrayed son John with great conviction, showing the character's strengths and weaknesses. In addition, we had Alex Barnett, George Cooper and Keir Gilbert-Halladey, so believable in the roles of the young Irish Guardsmen, Bowe, McHugh and Doyle, facing the horrors of the trenches. Just as important were the supporting roles filled by David Morgan, Peter Shore and Jonathan Tull who also helpfully doubled up as stage crew in the major scene changes. With impressive sound effects provided by John Chinnock complemented by lighting by Alan Bishop, stage management by Muriel Lister and costumes by Elizabeth Callow and Catherine Webber, this production was a real team effort



and we thank everyone who helped make this production such a resounding success. A special thank you goes to Alex Barnett (Guardsman Bowe), who after a lot of badgering made the ultimate sacrifice for a 16 year old by having his hair cut short for the part!

Leaving the sadness of war behind us, we are now in rehearsal for Babes in the Wood, our annual pantomime (9th to 17th January 2015). With their parents away at the Crusades, Jack and Jill must rely on their uncle, Sir Guy of Gisbourne, to look after them but Sir Guy is more interested in the children's money. Protecting Jack and Jill from their wicked uncle and getting them home safely is obviously a job for a hero, but the only local one has not been seen for many years. Chris Bassett directs this panto which is the sequel to our hilarious and successful 2010 production of Robin Hood and His Merry Men in which Peter Calver played the title role. He returns to the more familiar territory of Dame for Babes in the Wood. An ageing Robin Hood is now played by Jonathan Tull, with David Morgan (Friar Tuck), Steve Bedford (Little John) and Andrew Claringbull (Will Scarlett) as the equally ageing band of hapless Merry Men. We have youngsters, Elliott Myers and Katie Bartholomew as Jack and Jill and our baddies are Clive MacTavish as Sir Guy and Kay Sandford as Lady Gisbourne. Added to the main players are Sophie MacTavish as Maid Marian, Carly Thompson as Lottie and Michael Hayes as her admirer Much. To complete the line up we have Janette White and Amanda Stronge as the incompetent guards, Eric and Ernie. Aimee Marie Bow and Jamie Cordell return as Choreographer and Musical Director, so that lively dancing and music is assured.
